Hopping Down the Cottontail Trail



This winter, CCLT volunteers of all ages have been donning their snowshoes to search for the elusive New England Cottontail rabbit. With training in December, adults and students became citizen scientists and have been conducting surveys of potential cottontail habitat sites identified in Cumberland and Chebeague Island. The field study is part of an overall survey from Portland to Brunswick organized by the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service and the New England Cottontail Coalition. Populations of the native New England Cottontails have been dwindling due to habitat loss, predation and natural causes. The sights and sounds of these vibrant wetlands are one of the greatest spectacles in Maine’s natural world. Conservation Easement Tax Incentives 2013



Congress just renewed an incentive that enables landowners to get a significant tax benefit for donating a conservation easement on their land. This invaluable conservation tool has helped CCLT work with many willing landowners to protect their land. The incentive allows easement donors to 1) deduct up to 50% of their adjusted gross income in any year (up from 30%) and 2) continue to take that deduction for as long as 16 years (up from 6 years). The financial impact of the enhanced tax incentive can be quite positive for the taxpayer. This incentive is a win-win for landowners and conservation. Landowners must act quickly, however, because the incentive is currently set to expire December 31, 2013. Some members of Congress are working to make the incentive a permanent option.
